



BY-LAWS OF THE INTERNATIONAL PADEL FEDERATION

INTRODUCTION

The International Padel Federation was founded in Madrid on 12 July 1991 by the legal representatives of the Argentine Padel Association, the Spanish Padel Association and the Uruguayan Padel Association, by means of Public deeds signed before the Notary Mr. Javier Gaspar Alfaro, with the protocol number 2486. The International Padel Federation is a non-profit making organization of unlimited duration whose goal is to promote all forms of padel throughout the world.

Art.1 - CONSTITUTION AND GOALS

- 1.1.** The International Padel Federation, henceforth the FIP, is the maximum authority in the world for padel in all its forms and the ultimate arbitrator for any question related to the sport.
- 1.2.** Without being limiting, the following are among the principles and objects of the FIP:
 - 1.2.1.** International oversight and management of padel in all countries and continents.
 - 1.2.2.** Establish and foster relations, contacts and negotiations with Associations, Federations and other sports related Organisations.
 - 1.2.3.** Upholding current padel rules whilst introducing any changes that may be needed to improve future development of the sport.
 - 1.2.4.** Achieving a consistent interpretation of padel rules and match control whilst providing recommendations and advice to Judges and Umpires.
 - 1.2.5.** Periodically printing and publishing, as required, all the standards and rules that may be necessary to enable the appropriate development of padel.
 - 1.2.6.** Ensuring compliance with standards and rules in all official competitions and establishing the conditions to be met in all international events.
 - 1.2.7.** Strengthening friendship and sporting ties between the different members and encouraging inscription of new members.
 - 1.2.8.** Requiring all the members to accept the sanctions that any one of them might impose on any of their own affiliates.
 - 1.2.9.** Acting as arbitrator and resolving any disputes between members, and in general, upholding the principles on which the FIP is founded, taking any measures that may appear necessary to defend the interests of padel from all points of view, including international.

Art. 2 – LANGUAGE

The official language of the FIP shall be Spanish.



Art. 3 – HEADQUARTERS

FIP's headquarters are located in Madrid Community, Spain as determined at the General Assembly and cannot be relocated to any other site unless so decided by the General Assembly. Current domicile is Calle Luis de Salazar, 9. Madrid – 28002. Spain, with the following email address secretaria@padelfip.com. Any change of email address or domicile within the Madrid Community must be approved by the board of directors of International Federation and subsequently submitted for approval by the General Assembly.

Art. 4 – ASSOCIATED MEMBERS

- 4.1. Membership to FIP is open to all national padel associations or corresponding organisations who must in turn acknowledge the FIP as sole governing body of the sport of padel throughout the world and accept the By-laws, rules and standards of the FIP. Only membership by one entity per state shall be accepted, understanding a state to be a country or nation, officially recognized by the International Olympic Committee (I.O.C.) or the United Nations (U.N.) It is essential that each Association is a non-profit Association. Upon acceptance, the said corresponding National Padel Associations or organisations will be known as "Associated Members". Each member association/national padel federation or corresponding organisation which requests membership to the FIP must emit licenses to its registered players.
 - 4.1.1. Upon being elected member of the FIP, each Associated Member automatically becomes a member of the Continental Federation corresponding to their country.
 - 4.1.2. With the agreement of the interested parties, the General Assembly has the authority to change the Continental Federation to which an Associated Member belongs.
- 4.2. Affiliation to the FIP is also open to any international organisation that might be founded by Associated Members in order to improve promotion of the sport in any specific part of the world, providing they accept the By-Laws, Rules and Standards of the FIP. The said international organisation will not accept as members any entity that is not itself an Associated Member of the FIP.
- 4.3. Clubs or organisations from countries without a national entity affiliated to the FIP can be admitted to the same as "Affiliated Organisations" under the terms and conditions to be decided by General Assembly. An "Affiliated Organisation" will provide all the support it can for the creation of an entity with national coverage.
- 4.4. The Associated Members and Affiliated Organisations agree not to present before any court of justice legal disputes between themselves or between themselves and the FIP, and their incorporation to the FIP implicitly implies that they renounce any right to take a dispute before a court of justice. Any such dispute shall be referred to the Court of Arbitration for Sport, unless the interested parties agree by common consent to anything else.

Art. 5 – GOVERNANCE

The governing groups within the FIP are following:

- The General Assembly
- The Board of Directors
- The President



Art. 6 – GENERAL ASSEMBLY

- 6.1.** The General Assembly is the maximum authority of the FIP and is composed of the representatives or delegates of the Associated Members. Attendance requirements and the numbers of votes granted to the delegates are specified in article 9.
- 6.2.** The General Assembly will be held once a year, in the city has been agreed upon at the previous General Assembly. The agenda of the General Assembly should cover at least the following points:
 - 6.2.1.** Approval of the minutes of the previous General Assembly and of the possible Extraordinary General Assembly that might have been held since the previous General Assembly.
 - 6.2.2.** The President's report.
 - 6.2.3.** Approval of the duly audited Balance Sheet and Profit and Loss Account of the previous exercise.
 - 6.2.4.** Study and consideration of the present affiliation request.
 - 6.2.5.** Election of President and Directors.
 - 6.2.6.** Study and consideration of all proposals presented in a due and timely manner.
 - 6.2.7.** Naming of Auditors for the following year.
 - 6.2.8.** Establishing of place and date of the following General Assembly.
- 6.3.** The Extraordinary General Assembly shall be called in every case by the President, either directly should graves circumstances require it, or at the request of half plus one of the members of the Board of Directors or if the calling of the meeting has been request by half plus one of the Associated Members, representing at least half plus one of the votes corresponding to all the Associated Members. The issues to be included in the Agenda should always be specified and the Extraordinary General Assembly may not deal with any others.
- 6.4.** The General Assemblies shall be considered valid if at least a third of the Associated Members with a right to vote attend.
- 6.5.** The President shall chair the General Assembly. In the absence of the President, the first Vice-President shall do so.
- 6.6.** The General Assemblies shall be run in accordance with these By-laws, the President shall have the final decision concerning the points of order and procedure, and however, they shall not have the authority to decide in issues of importance with out the consent of the General Assembly.
- 6.7.** Unless otherwise stated within these By-laws, voting shall be decided by simple majority of the votes cast.



Art. 7 – CALLING OF GENERAL ASSEMBLIES

7.1. The General Assembly shall be called by email, specifying the date, the time, the venue and the Agenda. Notice shall be given to:

- Associated Members.
- Members of the Board of Directors.
- Delegates and deputy delegates named by each Associated Members to represent them at the General Assembly as soon as the FIP has been notified of their names and addresses.
- International Organisations to which the FIP is affiliated.
- Affiliated Organisations.

7.2. Notice should be sent at least seven weeks before the date set for the General Assembly; however accidental omission to give notice to any person entitled, to receive notice, in accordance with the previous point, shall not invalidate the proceedings of that General Assembly.

Art. 8 – PROPOSALS AND AMENDMENTS

8.1. To add an issue to the Agenda of a General Assembly, the Associated Member should send the request for the inclusion by email to the General Secretary of the FIP, at their official email address, so that it is received at least 90 days before the date set for the General Assembly. For the email request to be valid it needs to be accompanied by the proof of confirmation receipt which is sent by the FIP Secretariat upon receipt of emails. Board of Directors may include in the Agenda all those matters they consider appropriate. Any proposal received within the indicated time frames must appear in the Agenda.

8.2. A proposal that is received after the aforementioned deadline and which does not affect in any manner the By-laws,(whose reform is competence of an extraordinary General Assembly) may be presented by the delegate of the Associated Member at the General Assembly and subsequently discussed, but will not be submitted to vote unless the General Assembly, by a majority of two thirds of the votes cast, consider the issue to be sufficiently urgent. Should such be the case, the vote will take place and, if accepted by the appropriate majority, the measure will be temporarily adopted until the following General Assembly.

8.3. The President of the General Assembly will not allow amendments to the text of the motions presented to be included in the Agenda, unless they refer to problems of wording which do not affect the meaning or intention of the same. In such a case, the simple majority would be required for its acceptance.

8.4. In order for a motion included in the Agenda at the request of an Associated Member to be discussed and put to vote, it must be previously presented by the delegate of the Associated Members who put the motion forward and must be seconded by at least one delegate of another Associated Member. Should this support not be provide, the issue will be neither discussed nor put to vote. Support from another delegate does not mean at once the motion has been discussed; the said delegate has to vote in favour. The proposal from the Board of Directors must be presented but do not require additional support to be discussed and voted upon.

Art. 9 – REPRESENTATION AND THE NUMBER OF VOTES IN THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

9.1. Subject to the conditions established in Art. 14, each Associated Member can name a maximum of two delegates to represent them in a General Assembly. The two delegates have the right to speak, but neither of them can back a motion put forward by the other. Only one delegate per Associated Member shall answer for all the votes corresponding to their representation.



- 9.2.** The name and email address of each delegate shall be sent via email to the General Secretary of the FIP, at their official email address, by the Secretary of each Associated Member which wishes to be represented. All these names should be received at least 24 hours prior to the beginning of the General Assembly.
- 9.3.** Only the Associated Members and the President of the FIP have the right to vote in the General Assembly. In order to name delegates to represent them and who have the right to speak and vote in any General Assembly, an Associated Member must be up to date in the payment of all fees, including those corresponding to the year in which the General Assembly is to be held.
- 9.4.** An Associated Member who has paid all their fees has the right to a minimum of one vote and a maximum of 5 votes, in which the following factors are taken into account:
- Number of affiliated players. (It is mandatory to issue of licences to all players to ensure effective control)
 - Number of World Championships in which they have participated out of the last three held.
 - World Championship titles in the last three championships.
- a)** Number of issued licences:
- Less than 1000 licences: 1 vote.
 - Between 1000 and 5000 licences: 2 votes.
 - Over 5000 licences: 3 votes.
- b)** Participation in the last three World Championships:
- Three consecutive championships with men's and/or women's team: 1 vote.
 - Last championship with men's and women's team: 1 vote.
- c)** World Champions Titles in the last three championships:
- For each world title in men's or women's category: 1 vote.
- The President of the FIP will have three votes and in the event of a draw, the deciding vote.
- 9.5.** The President has the authority to invite observers to a General Assembly but they shall have no say in them.
- 9.6.** No delegate may vote in representation of more than one Associated Member.
- 9.7.** Each International Affiliated Organisation and each Affiliated Organisation may have the same representation as the Associated Members but without the right to vote. The representatives will be named in accordance with points 9.1 and 9.2.
- 9.8.** The members of the Board of Directors have the right to attend and to speak in the General Assemblies, but not that of vote, unless they are so authorised for other reasons.
- 9.9.** The Secretary General and the treasurer have the right to attend and speak in the General Assemblies. The Presidents of the constituted Commissions have the right to attend and speak in the General Assemblies with the permission of the President.



Art. 10 – BOARD OF DIRECTORS

10.1 The Board of Directors is made up, amongst others, of a President, a First Vice-President and four Vice-Presidents, all non-remunerated posts (henceforth known as directors). The following requisites must be met in order to hold any these offices:

- Be of legal age
- Not have been sanctioned or disqualified by any national or international sport organisation for a period greater than 90 days.
- Not be directly or indirectly linked to any commercial activity related to the sport of padel.

Moreover, the position of President is incompatible with any other national or international position within the structure of the FIP or depending on the same.

10.1.1. The directors are authorised to attend the General Assembly but, with the exception of the President, have no voting rights. However, they may speak about any issue under consideration.

10.1.2. The President will be appointed on the 1st August following their election in the General Assembly. Presidential mandates will last four year and must coincide with Olympic periods.

10.1.3. In the event of the termination, resignation, inhabilitation or death of the President, he/she will be succeeded by the first Vice-President until the following Assembly.

10.1.4. All the Directors, except the President, will take up their posts immediately after the end of the General Assembly in which they have been elected and their mandate will be for a re-electable three years.

10.1.5. Should a Vice-President stand down before the end of corresponding period, a substitute will be elected in the following General Assembly.

10.2. The Board of Directors will have sufficient administrative power to carry out all the work related to the FIP between the General Assemblies. These powers shall confer the necessary authority to resolve disputed issues which are not defined in the By-laws of the FIP.

10.3 The First Vice-President will stand in for the President, in their absence or in case of impediment, to all intents and purposes. When standing in for the President, the Vice-President is subject to the same incompatibilities as the former.

10.4. The Vice-Presidents jointly form part of the Board of Directors however they are further more directly responsible for different work areas: Administrative, Institutional, Sporting and Promotion.

10.5. The Board of Directors shall be made up of:

10.5.1. Those Directors mentioned in point 10.1.

10.5.2 A General Secretary named by the President, who must live in the city where the headquarters of the FIP is located.

10.5.3 A Treasurer named by the President, who must live in the city where the headquarters of the FIP is located.

10.6. The General Secretary may act as Treasurer.

10.7. The meetings of the Board Directors shall be chaired by the President of the FIP.



10.8. The General Assembly or, in the event, the Board Directors will, in accordance with the regulations, determine the area and degree of the work to be carried out the Committees created, establishing their scope, responsibilities and obligations, as well as the internal structure of each one. The Disciplinary Committee and the Competition Committee need to be created; the Board of Directors will be responsible for the appointment and for designating the person to preside.

Art.11- THE PRESIDENT

11.1. Is the legal representative of the FIP and shall sign all the necessary documents, agreements and powers.

11.2. Shall call and chair the Board Directors, Annual or Extraordinary General Assemblies.

11.3. Shall appoint and terminate the General Secretary, the Treasurer and the Presidents of the Commissions.

11.4. Shall in cases of urgency, adopt the decisions considered reasonable, notifying and explaining rationale to the Board of Directors of his/her measures in short order.

11.5. Will be aided by the Presidential Committee, composed of the President himself/herself, the General Secretary, the Treasurer and a maximum of three advisors, which are named by the President.

Art. 12 – CANDIDATES, NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS

12.1 Nominations for candidates for the positions of President or first Vice-President may be made by any Associated Member or by the Board of Directors. These nominations shall be sent via email directly to the General Secretary of the FIP at their the official email address , at least 90 days before the date set for the General Assembly. The names of the candidates and of the people nominating them shall appear on the Agenda. Having been a member of the Board of Directors for two consecutive years is a pre- requisite for nomination to First Vice-President.

12.2 Other Directors.

12.2.1 Nominations of candidates for Directors will be made via email to the General Secretary of the FIP at their official email address to arrive at least 90 days before the date set for the General Assembly.

12.2.2. Nominations of candidates can be made by any Associated Member, by any Director and by the Board of Directors itself. Those candidates who are not presented by the Board Directors should be seconded by a different Associate Member or Director than that which put them forward. Support for candidates shall be expressed in writing by email at the official FIP email address within the same time frame as the nomination of candidates.

12.2.3. Nomination of candidates shall be accompanied by brief curriculum vitae.

12.2.4. The names of the candidates, the individuals putting their name forward, and their CVs will be included in the Agenda of the General Assembly.

12.3. In order to nominate or second motions for election the Presidents, the Vice-Presidents, or other Directors, the Associated Members must be up to date with their affiliation fees, including those corresponding to the year in which the General Assembly is to be held.

12.4. The ballots to allocate the offices shall be secret. The number of votes obtained by each candidate shall be announced with the result of the ballot.



Art. 13 – AFFILIATION

13.1 Requests for affiliation by the National Padel Associations or Organisations will follow the following procedure:

13.1.1 The requests for affiliation for a National Padel Association or corresponding Organisation should be made on the appropriate form (see annex 1) and sent to the Secretary General of the FIP. The request will include information referring to the country to be represented and specify the number of affiliated clubs and players. A copy of the articles of Association, the By-laws and the names and addresses of the main directors shall be included. Their By-laws must be wholly compatible with those of the FIP.

13.1.2 The Secretary General of the FIP will transmit the request along with the received information to the secretaries of all the Associated Members.

13.1.3 If, within a delay of two months from the date of said notification, no objection has been received from any Associated Member, then the Board of Directors, will have the right to name the applicant Associated Member. The other Associated Members will be informed of the acceptance as soon as possible.

13.1.4 Should any protest be received from one or various Associated Members the application will not be studied by the Board of Directors, but will be referred, along with the received reasons or objections and their sources, to the consideration of the following General Assembly this issue being included in the Agenda.

13.2 Each Associated Member or Affiliated Organisation shall provide the General Secretary of the FIP with all the information that may be required for administrative and informative purposes before the 31 May each year. This information will include the address of the headquarters, e-mail address, telephone and fax numbers of the entity, names and addresses of the main directors, the number of affiliated clubs and players, the official competitions held.

Art. 14 – AFFILIATION FEES AND PAYMENTS

14.1 Each year all the Associated Members must pay an Affiliation fee to help towards the costs of the FIP. These fees will be based on a points scale and the amount will be determined in accordance with paragraph 14.7. Any Associated Member which has not paid their corresponding fees will not be able to participate in an official competition which depends on the FIP, nor participate in those organised by others.

14.2 The Affiliation fees are jointly for the FIP and the Continental Federations. Fifty percent of the Affiliation fees received by the FIP will be transferred to the Continental Federations.

14.3 The fees will be set in accordance with the number of affiliated players of each Associated Member the previous year and the number of corresponding votes in accordance with paragraph 9.4.

- The amount in US dollars set by the General Assembly will be paid for each vote.
- According to the number of licences:

Until 3000	(1) \$ Usa

(1) The amount set by the General Assembly.



- 14.4** Each Associated Member will submit to the Secretary General before 28 February each year a certificate specifying the number of players with a licence on 31 December the previous year. The Board of Directors will have the right to reject the information provided and also, should the certificate not have been received, to fix an estimated number basing it on the available information. The Associated Member can appeal the decision within a period of 10 days should they so desire, but proof of the charge lies on the decision of the Board of Directors shall be final and the Affiliation fees will be calculated based accordingly.
- 14.5** International Organisations shall not pay Affiliation fees.
- 14.6** Affiliated Organisations shall not pay Affiliation fees.
- 14.7** The value of the points in the scale included in paragraph 14.3 and the currency in which to pay will be set by the General Assembly.
- 14.8** The Affiliation fees should be paid before any Associated Member or their representative teams participate in any official competition depending on the FIP. Should the competition be held before the corresponding Affiliation fee has been set, the same amount as the previous year will be paid, the payment being adjusted when the Affiliation fee is known.
- 14.9** Should an Associated Member not have notified the Secretary General of their intention to withdraw from the FIP and not have paid their fees before the General Assembly is held, the Board of Directors has the right to consider that the Associated Member does not wish to continue the affiliation and act in consequence.
- 14.10** The players related to an Affiliated Organisation or who are resident in countries in which there is no entity with any kind of relation with the FIP or while being associate members are not up to date with the payment of the affiliation fee will require prior authorisation from the Board of Directors to participate in a FIP competition.

Art. 15 – TERMINATION OR SUSPENSION OF THE AFFILIATION

- 15.1** An Associated Member that desires to terminate their affiliation to the FIP should notify the Secretary General in writing before 31 December otherwise the Affiliation fees corresponding to the following year will be considered due.
- 15.2** At least three quarters of the votes cast will be necessary to expulse an Associated Member from the FIP during a General Assembly. In said circumstances, the Secretary General should notify the Associated Member of the termination of the affiliation as quickly as possible.
- 15.3** Between General Assemblies, the Board of Directors has the power to suspend the affiliation of an Associated Member if, in its opinion, the Member is acting against the interests FIP or its principles or aims, or if there is evidence of lack of activity. (An Associated Member is considered active when the affiliated players are controlled through the issue of licences, it organises official absolute competitions annually.) Suspension is a temporary sanction and so the General Assembly cannot start a suspension or require the Board of Directors to do so.
- 15.4** The Board of Directors can put an end to the suspension at any time.
- 15.5** If a suspension enters into effect before a General Assembly is held, the General Assembly can vote to uphold or revoke the suspension, which requires the majority of the issued votes.
- 15.6** The fact that the General Assembly upholds the sanction does not alter the authority of the Board of Directors to revoke the suspension once new events come to light.



15.7 Affiliation fees or other payments incurred by the suspended Member will not be paid during the suspension period. If a Member is suspended, and while it is, it will be deprived of all the affiliation rights and will not be able to participate in any of the acts depending on or sponsored by the FIP, be they sporting or social.

Art. 16 – DOPING

16.1 A necessary condition for affiliation to the FIP is that the Associated Member accepts and supports the current policy within the FIP of rejecting doping.

16.2 Associated Members should in particular respect the requirements concerning doping that have been set by the IOC/AMA and should cooperate with the FIP in the measures taken to detect and penalise any infraction.

16.3 The Board of Directors is authorised to develop and publish procedures and regulations to control doping, establishing the sporting sanctions that correspond to those who have broken the rules and in general take the educational measures it considers appropriate to guide players, judges, organisers and the people responsible for the doping controls in competitions.

Art. 17 – DISCIPLINE

17.1 The Board of Directors or any disciplinary committee created by the former, has the authority, on behalf of the FIP, to sanction an Associated Member, player, umpires or judges, or other people for infraction of the anti-doping rules, for inappropriate behaviour in a competition, or for actions that can give rise to negative publicity to the sport of Padel.

17.1.1 The sanctions can take the form of a suspension, fines, other measures or a combination of them.

17.1.2 The suspensions will be for all the sporting events and for the time considered appropriate, including life.

17.1.3 Any fine imposed on a player or another person shall be communicated to the Associated Member to which they belong, who will then be responsible for collecting the payment for the FIP, within 60 days from the date of notification.

17.2 The suspension can be applied once the player has had the occasion to explain their behaviour, or should there be evidence of particularly inappropriate behaviour, at any time.



Art. 18 – ACCOUNTING EXERCISE

- 18.1** The financial and accounting year will close on 31 December and the President will ensure that the report is drawn up and audited in the briefest possible delay.
- 18.2** The Board of Directors can designate a Company to carry out, under the supervision of the person with financial responsibility, the necessary financial and accounting tasks, including the appropriate balances, statements or reports.

Art. 19 – VARIATIONS IN THE PADEL RULES OR IN THE RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE UMPIRES OR JUDGES

- 19.1** The Rules of Padel can be modified in a General Assembly. Any proposal that may require a modification must be supported by a majority of two thirds of the votes cast. This article cannot be changed without the unanimous consent of a General Assembly.
- 19.2** The General Assembly is authorised to consider proposals that alter the rules only during 4 year intervals, beginning at the General Assembly of the 2004, unless special circumstances exist, that, in the opinion of four-fifths of the votes cast, justify the need to consider certain variations.
- 19.3** The Board of Directors shall have the authority, on behalf of the FIP, to introduce variations to the recommendations to umpires and judges, to the sporting vocabulary employed and to the lay out and indexes of the rules, as long as these variations do not imply a change of padel rules.
- 19.4** The Board of Directors is authorised, on behalf of the FIP, to carry out experimental variations to the Padel Rules.

Art. 20 – VARIATIONS TO THE COMPETITION RULES

The Management Committee is authorised, on behalf of FIP, to introduce amendments to the regulations that control the organisation, management and classification requirements of the competitions.

Art. 21 – AMENDMENTS TO THE BY-LAWS

- 21.1** With the exception of the points mentioned in articles 18 and 21, these By-laws may be amended in a General Assembly, as long as the proposed amendment has been included in the Agenda of the General Assembly and is supported by at least two-thirds of the votes cast.
- 21.2.** Any amendment to the By-laws will not enter into effect until all the proposals included in paragraph 7.1.6. Have been analysed.



Art. 22 – DISSOLUTION

22.1 The FIP cannot be dissolved unless a General Assembly is called which solely has this motion on the Agenda, the motion then being approved by a majority of at least four-fifths of the votes cast.

22.2 Should dissolution occur, the assets of the FIP will be divided between the Associated Members in proportion to the Affiliation fees paid by each one.

Provisional Article.

Art.1- Ref. Paragraph 4.1.1

The Continental Federations should be officially founded before being able to benefit from the provisions set out in the By-laws.
